Oak Park





Yesterday, the CRR Division gave a crucial safety presentation at the Oak Park Retirement Resort. Chief Tharp educated residents on one of the leading causes of EMS calls to retirement communities in the Katy Area – slips, trips, and falls. To help reduce the risk of falls during the night, night lights were distributed to the residents.

Did you know that according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), falls are the primary cause of injury for adults aged 65 years and older? Shockingly, over 14 million, or one in four older adults report falling every year. In 2021, there was an average of 7,810 EMS fall-related calls per month for adults aged 65 years and above. In 2020, Texas reported 1,051,796 falls.




